


THREE PROMINENT REPUBLICANS.

Cleveland, Sept. 11.—The State Department has but received a copy of the bill reported to the House on Sept. 2 summarizing the provisions of the bill reported to the Colombian Congress, which will give the United States full right to study the conditions upon which the construction of the Panama Canal will be undertaken, and the amount of compensation recommended by the committee.

Approval of the action of the Senate in rejecting the Hay-Herran Treaty, authority to begin to the President to make a treaty with Colombia, and to contract for a canal with private parties, subject to the rights of the United States.

The Panama Railway Company is permitted to transfer its property to the purchaser, including the annual rental of \$1,000,000, and the right to sell its property to Colombia in 1922.

It is further provided that the company be entitled to transfer its rights and property to another for \$10,000,000.

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NEW STATE CHAMPION.

N. S. Campbell Defeated A. L. Hayes Six Up and Five to Play.

BEAUTIFUL GOLF SHOWN IN FINALS OF TOURNAMENT.

Hays Played a Plucky Under-Hill Game, but Was No Match for the Machine-like Precision of His Opponent and the Contest Was Never in Doubt after the First Round of the Morning Play.

N. S. Campbell of the Agawam Hunt and the Yale golf team is the new Rhode Island State champion. He beat the man who won it, Hayes, the British champion yesterday in a score of six up and five to play. The game was at the thirty-second hole. Although the Yale player had the lead, he had no match for the machine-like precision of his opponent, and the contest was never in doubt after the first round of the morning play.

Campbell, with the exception of a few holes, had the lead all day. Two of his rounds were negotiated in record time, and he was off the tee by the time the first hole was reached, and although the British man had the lead for the first half of the game, there was something the latter could do. Another man could have beaten the Yale player in the first round, but not in the first seven holes of this round, and it was evident that the Yale player, a trifle longer he would have lowered his head and given up, but the quality of the game he was playing was the quality of the game he was playing.

As it was, the new champion's morning game was a most creditable score of 72, a most creditable score for a man who was unable to hold his own in the second half of the game after the sound and sweep of the morning play six holes down.

Campbell, though somewhat outclassed in his game, did not let up, and improved his opportunity, he might almost say, to the last hole.

As it was, the 27th was the low point of the morning game, and the 28th Campbell even on the round. This lead was maintained until the 32d, and the match was won by the Yale man.

Campbell easily outlasted his opponent, and had the lead in the afternoon, but did not improve his game, and had to give up the lead in the morning.

The short game hours had been long, however, and the victor was the stronger, and at times he played like a machine, and at other times he was somewhat of a surprise, as this happened in the 27th hole.

While Hayes' drives were more accurate than Campbell's, the latter's were more accurate as Campbell was on the course repeatedly, both on drives and putts.
