The Grays came back yesterday to the high speed, as before last champions, from the overwhelming defeat sustained at the hands of the Virginians Monday, and took them men in tow in both ends of the double-header, the first being registered at 7 to 2 and the second at 5 to 1. A very enthusiastic crowd of 2200 fans, the largest attendance of the campaign, took in the bill and appeared to enjoy the discomfiture of the visitors, who had counted on a victory before they were batted.

Outpitched, outbatted and outfielded, the invaders pursued a forlorn hope in each contest, but no stubborn was the spirit that they put up with them to the finish of each game than the fans did to shouting until the final out.

Joe Greager, the hurler whom Jack Dunn says is the greatest mound man on the circuit, was Manager Shreve's offering in the initial melee, and the former Phillie delivered the high-class brand of flinging that has made him a retort favorite in these designs.

The Southerners belied his speed and curve to safe territory eight times. Dunn, Aaron and Jordan being the leading batters, but, barring the second round, in which three hits were clustered for a tally, and the sixth, in which three more were batted for a run, the Grays were able to make no impression on the stuff.

Wins Gold Medal in Qualifying Round at R. I. C. C.

MARK A RECORD FOR COURSE

Patrick Wins Second with 185.

Gardner is Third and MacDonald Fourth—Lowest Score to Qualify is 170—Favorable Conditions for Play.

Roger Hovey won the gold medal for the low score in the qualifying round for the Rhode Island golf championship yesterday afternoon on the Rhode Island Country Club links at Narragansett.

Hovey's play was the finest and most consistent seen at the course in some time. Going 18 holes in 55 strokes in the morning, he expected to see him practically duplicate the feat in the afternoon with a 54.

The playing was close and the scores better yesterday than those of a year ago. Dan Fairchild yesterday made the 36 hole nine low stroke which was eliminated when he won the gold medal, and yet was four more than Hovey. Dr. C. H. Gardner, present holder of the title, was this and W. M. P. MacDonald, fourth in point of low score made.

The lowest score to qualify was 174, while a year ago the low score for qualification was 180. N. C. Gardner, Jr., Hovey's son, F. H. Hancock, were at 174, and had to play off the tie to eliminate the low man. In playing off the tie of the contestants got away with beautiful drives, which landed within a few feet of the hole.

On the second shot, A. W. Hancock drove the ball over the green and his son, F. H. Hancock, drove into the grass to the left of the green.

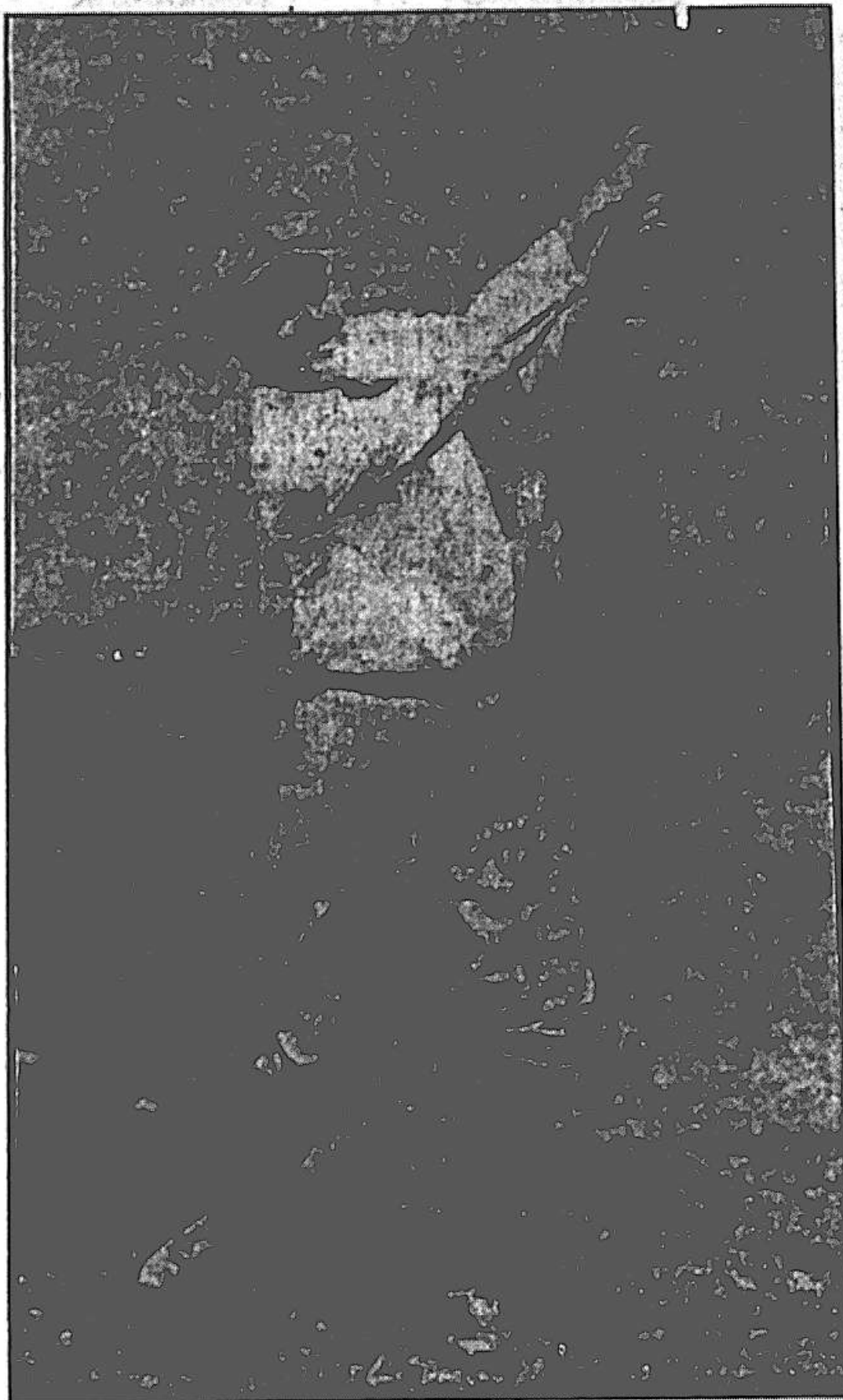
