The State championship entry list closed with 89 entries, but some more, delayed in the mails, may be received to boost the list to 100. The event starts at the Rhode Island Country Club to-morrow, and the courtesy of the club has been extended to all who participate in the play. Yesterday many of those who would claim the State title were at the club and played 18 holes or more.

The entry list includes all of the local cracks, with the exception of Danny Fairchild. The entry of John A. Gammons, the present titleholder, has been received, and if he has recovered fully from a shoulder injury, he is to be included in those whose chances look best for the title. As a friend expressed it yesterday, "Daff" will play if it is only on one leg. His thorough-going sportsmanship is appreciated without the confines of the State as much as it is inside."

GARTNER LEADS FIELD IN

SCORES 152 IN MEDAL ROUND PLAY AT R. I. C. C.

Hancock Finishes Second with 153.—Only Five Players Break 160.—Gammmons, Kenyon, MacDonald, and Wray Fail to Qualify

It is Gartner of the Metacommet Club who led a large field here in the qualifying round for the State golf championship, which started at the Rhode Island Country Club yesterday. His 36-hole card showed a 152, which was one stroke lower than that of his clubmate, Fred Hancock, who had five players succeeded in breaking 160, notwithstanding the fact that the Rhode Island Country Club, Jew Dinton of the Metacommet Club and Harry Kenworthy, from the same club, were the fortunate players.

The day was full of surprises. J. A. Gammmons of the Metacommet Country Club and present titleholder, finding the going rough throughout the day, and finishing with George J. Collett at 171. Others who failed to qualify included J. S. Kenyon, captain of the State golf team; Marshall MacDonald, who had finished in the qualifying last year as any other player; Phil Wray, the young golfer from the Wampanoag Country Club, who was picked by many as a sure good chance for the title; Earl Crandall, R. E. Sisson of the Wampanoag Country Club, a semi-finalist in last year's play, and H. P. McCourt, for many years a member of the State team.

From the ranks came Lincoln of the Rhode Island Country Club, who stood third in the qualifying list; G. Mayer of the Metacommet Golf Club; A. McElride, a brother of former State Champion Frank E. McElride; H. Tryon, the 17-year-old high school boy, who is making the best of these play golf days, and L. Smith, Kenworthy of Quaker and now of Wampanoag. J. L. Lineberry of Newport also edged into the select list.

For some reason or other, the scores were not as low as expected. Harry Kenworthy, who the day before, had a card of 148 in the amateur match, struck a 155 last yesterday. Former State Champion R. D. Hooks was safely in with 162, while N. S. Campbell scored 165. Gartner and Hancock played very good golf. The former had a 75 in the morning and a 77 in the afternoon. Hancock made 78 in the morning and 75 in the afternoon. On the other hand, Hancock's short putt at the 16th green missed. Hancock from finishing in the top for the medal.

In many respects it was one of the most interesting qualifying rounds ever played here. There were 95 entries, some of whom withdrew from the match play today.

As the afternoon went along it seemed as if 174 would qualify for the first 16. Dr. McCourt was at this mark. Then he was eliminated and R. S. Sisson, a high grade player, was on the danger line. He went down and Phil Wray's friends looked to see him the 16th man at 172. He was eliminated as if H. A. Gammmons would have to play off at 171 to decide who should qualify. But R. L. Smith of Wampanoag came in to shut these two out of the division. Jim Kenyon at 170 was the last to go, in a day of surprises in which the grand old Rhode Island golf suffered.

But none of the younger players are coming along. H. H. Rust, Jr., a team-mate of Phil Wray, recognized as one of the strongest players in the State, qualified with a fairly good score. Cliff McElride not only qualified at 165 with Rust, but he had the best hole-in-one of the day. His card out in the afternoon showed 4 4 3 3 4 5 4 35. This was very good shooting and he will make a worthy opponent for any player on the list. E. E. Coleman of the Wampanoag, who seldom shows in the open events, has a knack of qualifying for State championships. This is the third straight championship he has won. In the first 16 and he was at 50 years of age that is satisfying indeed. Looking over the score sheets one will find that 78 2's were made on the island 17th hole and eight 2's at the same hole. This is a hole which is either made in par five or much above that. There was no wind to speak of yesterday and this probably tells the story.

The drawings lead one to believe that Gartner will meet Kenworthy in the second round this afternoon and Hancock will play Tryon in the upper half of the draw. In the lower half, Linton, Mayer, Hooks and Hancock are the favorites. Whatever way the second round matches result there will remain the nucleus for some splendid semi-finalist to-morrow.

The first round matches for the first 16 will start at 9:15 and a large gallery is expected. Gartner will find no easy opponent in young Cliff McElride. Three years ago McElride gave Gammmons a tough battle in the second 18 and he is much more confident now.

The match between Campbell and Kenworthy should be close, with the odds in favor of the latter due to his splendid showing in the spring tournaments. MacColl should defeat Coleman, and Tryon, who can play much better than his score of yesterday would indicate, has a shot over Lincoln.

Dolan will make Linton play to win, while Mayer is the favorite to defeat Lineberry. Hooks always plays the Rhode Island Country Club course well and is favored to defeat R. L. Smith. The match between Rust Jr. and Hancock should provide the feature one for this morning.

BABE RUTH INJURED IN FALL AT CHICAGO

Brookline, Mass., July 14.—(AP)—Creston Holman and Lionel Ogdan, seeded players of the Longwood doubles tournament at the Longwood Cricket Club today were eliminated in the second round by Henry L. Johnson, Jr., and Malcolm T. Patterson of Australia. Johnson, a former national boys' champion, defeated the Western collegians, 7-6, 6-4. Greater steadiness and decisive volleying brought the victory.

In the singles, six of the remaining seeded players gained the third round bracket and came against Gerald L. Patterson of Australia, first seeded foreigner. Frederic Mercur of Bethelton, the former titleholder, won the first to contend with Patterson for the semi-finalist next Thursday. John R. Haxel, another player from the West, went down under, won from Lionel Ogdan after dropping the second set.

The Japanese Davis Cup players, Shimizu, Harada and Fukuda, swept through their singles encounters, dropping only 15 games in nine sets. Fukuda was pressed at times by Alden Holm-Smith, Cambridge University player, but finally defeated him by greater speed.

Carl Fischer, former intercollegiate champion, defeated him and will meet N. W. Niles to-morrow and Arnold Jones, Yale tennis champion, will oppose Masanobu Kikuchi.

SEAWANHAKA CUP WILL RETURN HERE

American Six-Metre Yacht Lanai Defeats Coila, British Defender, in Final.

VICTORY BY 22 SECONDS

Challenger Gets Away in Lead and Retains It to Finish in Race Over 14-Mile Course Off Scotland

Hythe, Scotland, July 14.—(AP)—An improved sailing weather with a stiff breeze from the south, the American six-metre yacht Lanai succeeded today in winning the second of the necessary three victories to take the Seawanhaka cup back to the United States.

Making a good start, the Lanai led throughout. The race was sailed over a windward and leeward course of 14 miles in two legs. The Lanai, carrying full sail, crossed the starting line a length ahead of the British defender, Coila. The times for the first round were: Lanai, 2 hours, 55 minutes, 26 seconds; Coila, 2 hours, 57 minutes, 3 seconds.

In the second round the Coila, by keeping to long tacks, made up to the leeward steadily and at the weather mark was only a minute astern.

From this point the race was very close, but although nearly caught at the finish, the Lanai was able to receive the winning gun 22 seconds ahead of her rival.

The final times were: Lanai, 4 hours, 20 minutes, 30 seconds; Coila, 4 hours, 20 minutes, 30 seconds.

The Coila won the first race on Saturday, while the Lanai was victorious yesterday.

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FOUR PLAYERS

UPSETS MARK FIRST AND SECOND ROUNDS

Kentworthy and Hancock, Favorites, Meet Defeat at R. I. C. C.—Gartner Plays MacColl and Rooks Takes On Mayer To-day

In a day replete with upsets, the State golf championships progressed through the second round yesterday, the survivors being H. M. Gartner, K. D. MacColl, Guy Mayer and R. D. Rooks, all but MacColl playing from the Metacomet Club. Kentworthy and Hancock, favorites for the title, were put out of the running in the first round, and Tryon, Doelman, Campbell and Rust were eliminated in the second.

A fairly large gallery watched the play in the afternoon, especially the Rooks-Rust, Jr., match, which went to the former 2 up, after one of the greatest comebacks of the tournament. Four down going to the eighth hole, Rooks was not even conceding an even chance to win, as his opponent was playing steadily, but once Rooks got his putter working, he began to cut down the lead and at the 13th hole had evened the match.

H. M. Gartner slipped into indifferent golf against N. S. Campbell and looked as if he was due for a good beating. Campbell, who had played great golf in eliminating Kentworthy, suddenly began to slice and miss and Gartner won three holes in a row and took command and never relinquished it.

Howard Tryon, after the best round of the tournament, a 34 for the first time, and a fine chance to tie or break the course record, slipped in his match against MacColl, who played steadily throughout, and was put out of the running. Mayer was down to Doelman for the greater part of the journey until he slipped a birdie 3 into the squeeze out a victory 2 up.

For the greater part of the spring season Kentworthy and Hancock have been sharing honors and have been exhibiting form which made them distinct favorites for the coveted honor. But Hancock missed out against Rust, because the Wannamoisett player was setting a great pace. Given at that Teddy flummied the cup and hung on the lip at the 18th when a 3 would have halved his match and given him a chance to win.

Rooks, of the four who will play in the semi-finals to-day, is the only one who has won a championship. Gartner has always been well up in the list and MacColl has been a sub-finalist. Mayer has never been as high as at present but on his game is hard to defeat.

To-day Gartner will square MacColl in the upper half of the semi-finals. MacColl knows the course like a book and Gartner has seldom failed to record a good score over it. It will be a match well worth watching.

The Rooks-Mayer match also promises to develop great golf. The former is one of the toughest men in the State to defeat. He is a good winner and a game player. If his work from the tee improves his game will be especially difficult to beat. Mayer is more or less of an unknown quantity. He has played exceptionally fine golf outside the State and he did well until he was eliminated by Hancock in the Metacomet Club championship.

The semi-finals will be at 10 holes and it is expected the first pair will start at 10 o'clock with the second pair following shortly afterwards. Rhode Island Golf Association officials hope to have the semi-finals and finale in all other classes completed by tonight so that the championship pair will have the course all to themselves.

Gartner and McBride were the first championship pair to start yesterday. Gartner began to pull up a lead and the match ended at the 14th hole with Gartner the winner, 6 up and 4 to play.

Then came Campbell and Kentworthy. The former has always been regarded as a ranking player in the State, but the golfers have not been able to get a line on his playing this season. Kentworthy's fine game has been especially commended and yet at the turn he was two down to his opponent. Campbell had a well rounded game, his tee shots being straight, his approaches close and his putting leaving nothing to be desired. He was 49 to the turn, but this striking included a number of intentional safety shots. Kentworthy was shooting 42 at the end of the nine holes.

Campbell won the first and fourth holes on the first nine and all the others were halved. The 10th went to him with a par 3 and he was 3 up. Then Kentworthy began to shoot. A 5 at the 11th, a 3 at the 12th and a 4 at the 13th evened the score. Campbell won the 14th, halved the 15th and took the 16th and 17th, the latter with a birdie 2. He won the match, 8 up and 1 to play.

The other upset came when H. B. Rust, Jr., of Wannamoisett defeated Teddy Hancock of Metacomet. Hancock shot six straight "4's" and yet Rust had him 2 up at the end of the sixth hole. Rust would have had a birdie at the sixth hole if Hancock had not laid him a symon. Rust was 2 up at the turn, but Hancock was fighting hard to keep in the running and he carried the match to the 14th green where he just missed a birdie to halve the match.

Howard Tryon played fine golf in his match with E. W. Lincoln of the Rhode Island Country Club, who has been in tournament golf but very little this season. Lincoln flattered him in the qualifying round and he gave Tryon a good argument yesterday. But Tryon was playing as good golf as has been shown in the tournament. He was always in the fairways and almost invariably on the green in 2. He had a 34 against a 35 for Lincoln for the first nine. Tryon won 5 up and 3 to play. In the second round Gartner defeated Campbell after trailing him for the greater part of the first nine holes. They were even at the turn, with Gartner playing a 45 and Campbell 43. The real turn in the match came at the 12th hole, which was halved in par 4. Campbell's ball was in the open while Gartner was shooting from a bad lie in the rough. His pitch was perfect and it enabled him to halve the hole and remain on even terms with his opponent.

Again going to the 13th, both players were in the rough. Campbell shot into a trap, nibbled out into another trap, used his nibbler again to go dead to the hole. He was playing 5. Gartner played out of the rough to a safe position, approached about 25 feet from the cup and then putted in for a par 4, to lead one up.

On the 14th Gartner drove into the rough and was half stymied by a tree. Campbell's drive went straight but he sliced his second into the rough at the sight of the green, while Gartner played safe into the open and then pitched a beauty to the green. He was 10 feet away but he putted down for another 4, a victory when Campbell missed his 4. The 15th and 16th holes were halved, and when both turned in 4's for the 17th the match was over and Gartner was the winner, 2 up and 1 to play.

Kenneth D.
