STATE AMATEUR **GOLF OPENS TODAY**

55 to Compete for Crown Held by Johnny Burke.—Oxnard Case Unsettled.

While a discussion of Brad Oxnard's amateur status was locker room gossip at clubs throughout the State the majority of the 50-odd entrants in the State amateur golf championship yesterday completed preparations for the title test which opens this morning at Metacomet.

There were no further developments in Oxnard's case. The matter has been left entirely to the United States Golf Association. Charley Hariney, R. I. G. A. secretary, late last night sent a complete report of the case to Jack Dey of Philadelphia, head of the U. S. G. A. amateur status and conduct committee. This committee will meet early this morning and wire Hartley its decision.

Oxnard, a golf range operator, filed his entry for the championship a few days ago. He was among the group who played practice rounds at Metacomet yesterday. Oxnard played far better than his score of 78 would indicate. He had 13 pars and one birdie, an excellent match play card. Around 35 played at Metacomet yesterday. Mike Bobel of Anna-quatucket, who will make his 1935 competitive debut in this championship, carded a 36, one under par for the first nine. His score yesterday proved conclusively that he is ready to make a serious bid for the title

he won two years ago.

Sam Neild, Jr., also of Annaquatucket, who won the State junior title last week, carded a 42 for the first nine, but then played the pext five in one under par. Everett Ru-pert of Metacomet was 42-37-79.

While most of his challengers were playing at Metacomet. Johnny Burke, of Wanumetonomy, defending champion, remained at his home course and played two rounds. He was 75 for each 18. Yesterday marked the first time within a week that Burke has played a full round.

Hartley received four more entries yesterday, bringing the total to 55. The new entrants are R. B. Knight of Agawam Hunt. C. A. Trottier, B. D. Rooks and E. E. Cheetham, all of Metacomet.

But Mike continue to concentrate upon his work. With July approaching and the 'Duke t! Phillipsdale" still tending solely to business, it was generally believed that this time his

decision would be steadfast. He also stated at the outset of the 1934 campaign that he was going to retire from competition for a year, but only a few weeks elapsed before he was back.

During the past few weeks, however. Mike began to weaken. golf urge had returned. He played a friendly match or two and then he began to waver. A few days later he decided to play in the State amateur. That's his story until yesterday.

The tale of his accomplishments yesterday take on an entirely different aspect. It is a story of a youth who led the best golf talent in this State in an exacting medal test. State Golf Favorites Survive Hard Battles in First Rounds

Ray Lenahon Stages Comeback to Win On Home Green from Tom C. Stockhausen; Metacomet Star Plays Last 14 Holes Under Even Fours

Success marked the efforts of all | Stockhausen was by far the best of the favorites during the first two rounds of match play in the State amateur golf championship tournament at Metacomet yesterday, but more than one of the leading lights had to call upon every shot in his possession to escape defeat.

Save for one or two exceptions, the eight names in - the quarter-final bracket have been synonymous with championship gol! in Rhode Island for many years. Thus far the seeded draw has worked to perfection.

Four of the eight survivors are from Metacomet. They are Ray Lenaban, runner-up last year; L. A. "Tony" McGowan, Jr., Charley Round and Jim Coker. Wanumetonomy's two remaining representatives are Johnny Burke, defending champion, and C. H. "Skinny" Edward. The Iwo other servivors are Mike Bobel of Annaquatucket, medalist, and Ken Bosquet of Pawtucket.

This morning's quarter-final pairings will find Bobel opposing Mc-Gowan, Edward playing Lenahan, Burke meeting Bosquet and Coker playing Round.

Of the successful eight, Lenahan had the hardest fight. He staged one of the most courageous comebacks in the history of this championship to defeat Tom C. Stockhausen of Jamestown and New York one up at the home hole. Lenahan's victory probably was the most spectacular of his

The match between Lenahan and

the day. It packed all the requisites of the ideal golf match—sensational play, nerve-wracking episodes and a garrison finish. The issue was not decided until the final putts were made.

Lenahan was a top-heavy favorite to win this second round battle. Stockhausen, a 22-year-old Yale Senior, had played well enough in the medal test and in his first round match with I. W. Patterson, Jr., of Annaquatucket. But Lenahan, one of the best shot-makers in this State. was expected to defeat him easily. Lenahan eliminated E. B. Graves of Rhode Island 5 and 3 in the first round, while Stockhausen defeated Patterson 3 and 2.

Lenahan and Stockhausen started without a gallery. Everyone expected a one-sided match but when they finished ever spectator on the course was trampling on their heels. They saw a match which they will not readily forget.

Stockhausen provided the first surprise at the 455-yard second where he dropped a 20-footer for an eagle three. Both players reached the green in two. Lenahan's par beater was of no avail against his foe's superb three. After the third was halved in par fours, the Yale student snared a birdie four at the fourth to become two up. Another

Burke and Lenahan to Clash In State Golf Final Today

1934 Champion and Runner-Up Meet Over 36-Hole Route at Metacomet.—Titleholder, in Fine Form, Scores Two 5 and 4 Victories

It's a Burke and Lenahan Final with L. A. "Tony" McGowan, Jr., of again!

Those words spread with telegraphic swiftness at Metacomet yesterday.

Last year's finalists again had won their way to the title bracket of the State amateur golf championship; Here was an unusual occurrence in tournament golf where upsets are more frequent than in any other sport.

Johnny Burke, the 18-year-old Wanumetonomy sorrel-top, will meet Ray Lenahan of Metacomet for the title today over the 36-hole route. They met in last year's final and Burke won.

Both scored spectacular victories yesterday to gain the final. With his game improving on each round. Burke won 5 and 4 victories over both Ken Bosquet of Pawtucket and Charley Round. He was one over even fours against Bosquet and one under even fours against Round.

Lenahan had a harder path to travel. He again was carried to the 18th pefore defeating C. H. "Skinny' Edward of Wanumetonomy one-up in the quarter-finals. Both played eratic golf. Lenahan carded an 81, his worst round this season, and Edward in 82.

But Lenahan proved himself a true competitor in his semi-final match with L. A. "Tony" McGowan, Jr., of Metacomet, whom he subdued 2 and I. McGowan had played sensational golf in the quarter-finals to defeat Mike Bobel, the medalist, at the 20th. This was the first genuine upset. Bobel was one of the strongest contenders for the title.

McGowan, a Harvard Sophomore. was two down and two to go in his match with Bobel. Defeat seemed certain for him. Bobel seldom gives an opponent an opening with such a lead. But McGowan staged a remarkable comeback to win the last two and halve the match. He won the 17th with a par four, but h needed a birdie three at the 18th to win. He placed his approach to within two feet of the pin. Bobel easily got a par four, but McGowan dropped his putt for a birdie. The Metacomet youngster snared another birdie four at the 20th and victory was his.

McGowan posted a 70, two under par, to defeat Bobel. He made the lowest score of the tournament, and used only 79 strokes for 20 holes. His excellent play against Bobel increased his chances of winning the title. Many picked him as the ultimate winner.

Lenahan well realized the capabilities of his foe. He was somewhat

Burke Downs Lenahan 9 and 8; Keeps R. I. Amateur Golf Title

18-Year-Old Newporter Fourth to Win Championship Two Years in Row; Wanumetonomy Member is Dominant Throughout Tournament

Johnny Burke, 18-year-old Wanu- | R. I. Country Club, 8 and 6. Winslow metonomy wizard, again sits on the throne of Rhode Island golfdom. He repelled the last of his challengers in the State amateur golf championship at Metacomet yesterday, overwhelming Ray Lenahan of the home club, 9 and 8, in the 36-hole title round.

Thus Burke becomes the fourth player to annex the State amateur title two years in a row. He is the youngest in the 33-year history of this tournament to accomplish this remarkable feat.

He takes a place by the side of G. A. Pope, Jr., Daniel Fairchild and Tommy Tailer as players whose double victories in this championship live in Rhode Island golf annals.

Pope was the first to win the crown two years running. He scored in 1905-06. Thirteen years passed before another double was registered by Fairchild in 1918-19. Twelve years later Tailer completed another double. He triumphed in 1930-31. And yesterday Burke repeated his victory of last year to join the golf immortals of this State.

Burke, who probably is the best golf prospect ever uncovered in Rhode Island, clearly showed his superiority over his 49 challengers. His victory this year was even more decisive than in 1934. Only one player. Arthur Winslow of Newport, was able to extend him to the 17th.

He started his victory drive by eliminating E. T. Gross, Jr., of the

held him to a 3 and 2 decision in the second round. He then subdued Ken Bosquet and Charley Round by 5 and 4 in the quarter-finals and semifinals, respectively. Yesterday he made a run-away of his final match with Lenahan.

It is an imposing list of triumphs in the State amateur gold classic. The foregoing statistics clearly show his superiority. Probably no other golfer in the history of this championship has so dominated his field.

It appeared after the qualifying round that Burke would have a fight on his hands to repeat. He missed a number of strokes in his medal test. His brother, Edmund, Wanumetonomy professional, was skeptical of Johnny's chances.

"He's not hitting his shots well," Edmund told this writer in a worried tone a few days prior to the championship, "He'll have to improve his game to win."

Edmund, who naturally takes considerable pride in his brother's achievements and watches nearly all of his matches, still was worried after Johnny's erratic play in the medal test.

He shook his head and said: "I told you he'll have to improve."

Johnny's game did improve; it grew better with each round. He was close to par while defeating Gross. He scored a par-equalizing
