

Pilkington Captures State Publix, 2 and 1

Don Pilkington, 36-year-old Providence salesman, yesterday captured his first major tournament crown in a lengthy golfing career when he defeated Andy Vallante of East Providence, 2 and 1, in the championship final of the State Public Links competition at Triggs Memorial.

The eldest of Little Rhody's famed golfing Pilkington brothers, Don grabbed an early lead and fought a front-running battle practically the entire distance as he defeated Vallante to the runner up role for the second straight year.

Vallante, beaten by Al List of Johnston in last year's title round, couldn't match Pilkington's opening start and was 3 down after six holes. But he then rallied and made things interesting the rest of the way as he closed his deficit to a lead hole on three different occasions.

Cutting loose with a trio of winning pars after taking the first hole of the afternoon round, Vallante launched the first of his three big threats but Pilkington, refusing to lose his poise in the face of his opponent's comeback, went two up again by winning the 23rd.

Over the 35-hole round, Pilkington racked up 22 pars, two birdies and an eagle. Vallante had 21 pars and two birdies. Pilkington was 147 for the 35 holes, seven-over-par, and Vallante was 150.

Nats Ring Up Their 4 Runs In 1st Inning

Boston—Jack Kralick exerted his considerable left-handed influence on the Red Sox last night as he pitched the Washington Senators to a 4-0 shutout over the Red Sox before a less-than-enthusiastic gallery of 11,053.

The slim southpaw from Youngstown, Ohio, limited the Sox to four singles, struck out six and gave up only two walks. Only one Sox runner advanced past first base and that wasn't until the seventh. Then Willie Tasby walked, after two were out, and raced to third on Gary Geiger's second single of the evening.

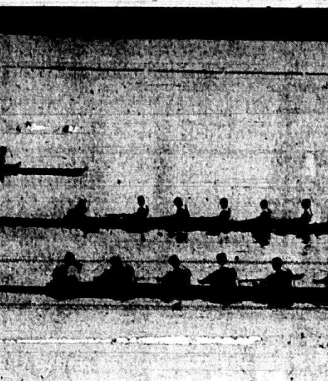

Monbouquette of Sox Humbles Yanks, 8-0 Gives 7 Hits, Fans 8 Makes Fine Recovery From Trouble in 7th

Boston — Billy Monbouquette rightly filled the toast of Boston today.

Last night, before Fenway Park's second largest gallery of the year, 32,437, the 23-year-old Red Sox right-hander won nearby Medford, goose-eyed the league-leading New York Yankees, 8-0, on a masterful pitching performance.

He gave up a total of seven hits and three walks but he was magnificently deliberate in his whitewash brush when he had to be. He spiked his sound effort with eight strikeouts, several of them in the last two when they'd do him the most good.

The Yanks had several minor threats but really only one major one—when they loaded the bases with only one on in the eighth and a 4 1/2 game lead.

The true dramatics of the game, even overshadowing the fourth and ninth, came in the seventh, when Monbouquette burst in the seventh, came in that New York evening.

Monbouquette opened the ninth with a strikeout of Bill Skowron who got two of the seven Yank hits—two doubles—Then, Sox pitcher struck out two strikes on the always dangerous Yogi Berra before the Yank catcher punched a double down the left field line.

Clonus Beyer singled deep into the shortstop hole, also after Monbouquette took two strikes on him. Then Monbouquette pinch-swinger Bob Carter, loading the bases.

Brilliant Clutch Pitching

At that important juncture Monbouquette regained control. He got pinch-hitter Gil McDougal on a strikeout and ended the inning as Tony Kubek lined out to Ted Williams in left field.

It was a brilliant bit of clutch pitching and the younger trichy-eyed pitcher's eighth triumph and second shutout of the season. His other—whitesash—performance was a one-hit, 50 conquest of Detroit here at the Fenway on May 7.

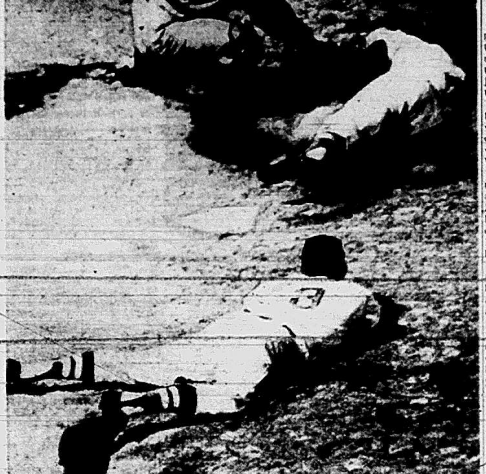
But even that sounder mound stint didn't give the impact of last night's good work because in this one he was facing the currently best team in the league—and their second best pitcher, Art Ditmar, who, also.

Ditmar, too, was rough—in the early going. The first eight batters he faced didn't get the ball out of the infield, but two out in the third Monbouquette broke the spell with a bloop single into short right.

Williams started things. That also was a portent of things to come—and they came in the fourth as Williams bled off with a single and Gary Geiger followed suit. After Vic Weritz was called out on strikes.

Malzone fled out but Don Buddin and Hayward Sullivan clipped in with runs scored. They were all the Sox needed, thanks to Monbouquette. But they made certain with six hits and the 13th inning when Willie Tasby, with a three-run homer, and Malzone, with a three-run double, were all individual heroes.

That splurge was at Fenway's expense. The Yankees' components were just those two hits, plus four walks. Tasby's round-tripper was really well-timed and hit the field in the field nets. It was his second of the year and second in six days. His grand slam was the slammer here last Sunday against the Athletics. If anything this one was better hit.

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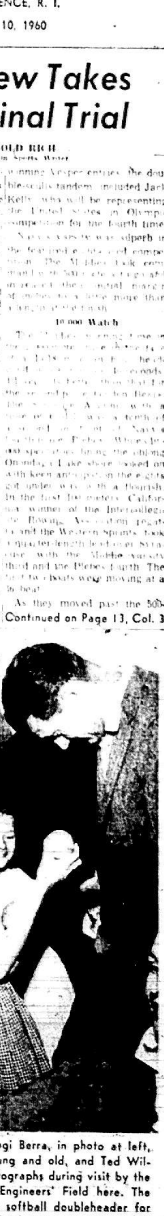

After that, it was just a question of how far ahead Wall would finish. Wall, scrambling over the final 18 holes, had three bogeys and six birdies and finished 66-67-67-69—269.

Hebert, except for an even-par 72 round on the third day would have given Wall a tougher fight. He finished 69-67-72-67—275 and tied Goalby, who fell off to a par 72 and settled for second-place money. His best finish this year.

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Allen Cops 5th R.I. Amateur Golf Title, Beating Kosten, 5 and 3

Victor Garners Third State Crown in Row

Bobby Allen, an automobile salesman and a member of Pawtucket Country Club, equalled every record in a specialized look by defeating Bob Kosten at Wannamoisett yesterday for the Rhode Island Amateur Golf Championship. The score was 5 and 3 after the playing of 33 holes.

For Allen, who is 36 and has many years of golf ahead of him, this was his fifth victory in the event. A record attained before him only by Dan Fairchild, who won his first in 1907 and his fifth in 1921. Allen's span of five championships began in 1919. He repeated in '30, came back in '38, '43 and yesterday.

By winning three years in a row, Allen equalled a record previously shared by Fairchild and the late Johnny Burke of Newport, who won as a casualty of World War II. Burke won in 1945 and 1946, but was disqualified in '47 on a technicality, won in '37, '37 and '38.

Some History
The antagonists in the final play needed no formal introduction. Kosten, a sales executive and a strong cutter at 187, won this championship three times before, once at the expense of Allen in a final match which was played at this same Wannamoisett Country Club in 1953.

They had also met in another important final match, that of the New England Amateur Championship, managed at Rhode Island Country Club in 1957. That titanic match went to 33 holes. Kosten won it. A year later, Allen became the New England champion, but without direct conflict with Kosten.

As Allen graciously said in accepting the championship trophy after the game was over: "This is a great day for me. More than the law of averages was involved. Allen also showed excellent defense. A linkman all New England records with respect."

Early Lead
Allen won the first two holes. Kosten used two putts after chipping on, and was never behind in the match. However, Kosten squandered it, briefly, by sinking a seven-foot putt for par on the fifth hole. Allen quickly got one back on the following hole, where Kosten used three strokes to get on the green and two putts. The first three holes to the ninth were halved, and at the turn Allen led by 1 up.

Allen increased his lead to 2 up in the morning round. When he hit the 11th, Kosten over-putted, took the 11th hole in three strokes. Kosten then won the 11th which Kosten had been putted a six-footer for a birdie, and lost the 14th where his drive was so long it overcame into the ditch.

For the morning play, the approximate match score—100 to 105—was in Kosten's favor. In the afternoon round, Allen and Kosten matched each other, hole-for-hole through the seventh. A hawk came at the eighth where Kosten failed to make a good recovery from a crass-and-land lie, and where Allen got out of a trap in splendid style for a par three at the 12th.

Turning Point
As one neutral observer saw it, the turning point came at the 13th. Allen trapped his second shot just short of the green, but recovered for a sure four. Kosten, on in two, three-putted.

It might be said that Kosten three-putted the 14th on the 22nd hole, but it was his first putt from from the apron which put him in the green. There have been several meetings, one in Chicago last week, in which civic and business leaders of Kansas City discussed the possibility of buying up the stock in order to keep the Athletics here.

Marion pointed out that money was no problem, for the aggregate wealth of his 15 associates, who now own the Houston Bulls of the American Association, is estimated at between \$25,000,000 and \$40,000,000. "We want major league baseball for Houston because we are sure it will be a success there," Marion said. "We'll get major league baseball any way we can."

If we fail to buy the Athletics we are hoping for expansion of the present leagues so Houston will become a member of one of the established major leagues.

Marion also said that Houston already has voted a bond issue for a 200,000 park which would seat 100,000 persons.

The former star shortstop and major league manager pointed out that Houston with a population of 225,000 is now the sixth largest city in the United States.

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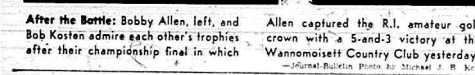
