Yanks Defeat Tigers, 4 to 3

Detroit — (AP) — Clete Boyer is knocked in three runs last night with a solo homer and a base-loaded single, leading the New York Yankees to a 4-3 victory over Detroit.

Boyer's leadoff homer in the fifth inning was the first hit off Detroit starter Hank Aguirre, who failed for the third straight time to record his 10th victory.

Boyer hit his single in the eighth off reliever Orlando Pena after the Yankees had loaded the bases on a pair of singles, fielders' choice and an intentional walk.

That gave New York a three-run lead and proved decisive.

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Mickey Mantle, Yastrzemski Out Of All-Star Star

Boston — (AP) — New York Yankees' outfielder Mickey Mantle and left fielder Carl Yastrzemski of the Boston Red Sox will not see action in major league baseball's All-Star game next week Joe Cronin, American League president said yesterday.

Cronin said that both men have pulled muscles and that their clubs advised him the players would not be able to play in the game at Minnesota, July 13.

Cronin said he asked Warren Giles, National League president for permission to replace the men and Giles agreed. Al Lopez, of the Chicago White Sox, the manager of the American League team selected catcher Bill Freehan of the Detroit Tigers and outfielder Tony Oliva of the Minnesota Twins as replacements.

Both Freehan and Oliva played on last year's All-Star team. Each finished third in the balloting this year.

Mauro Leads R.I. Golf Qualifying Test

Ed Shoots 70, Garganese 71 In 1st Round

Playing consistently good golf, Ed Mauro Jr. of Metacommet surged into the lead during the first round of qualifying play in the R.I. Amateur Golf Championship, Turney yesterday, at the Warwick Country Club.

Mauro, hitting 13 greens in regulation fashion and missing only two fairways with tee shots, set the pace with a 33-77-70 over the hush, windswept, par-69 layout. He finished one stroke ahead of the field at the halfway point in the 36-hole qualifying test.

Hard on his heels after comparable steadiness was Dino Garganese of Pawtucket, 36-35-71, thereby creating the probability of a stirring duel today in the second 18-hole chase after the medal.

After Mauro and Garganese the field scattered pretty well, their closest pursuers being Ronnie Quinn of West Warwick and Bob Coupe of the host club with 74's.

Campy Has 75
After them, came Fred Campanelli of Metacommet, the defending champion with a 75. Campy, as 1964 champ, doesn't have to qualify, but is playing just for instance. He was well satisfied with his round and seems ready to make a stout defense of his title.

With Campanelli already assured of a spot among the 32 qualifiers for match play, a heated battle for survival is expected today. Yesterday, there were five bunched at 76 and seven more at 77. The scrap for the final five places should develop into a free-for-all.

Yesterday, 32 players carded 78's or better, and there were nine 79's, 17 80's and eight 81's—and most of them figure to be better today.

Mauro's Round
In setting the pace, Mauro rattled off eight straight pars before he altered the pattern by scoring a birdie on the ninth hole. That was a thing of beauty—a 50-foot putt that followed the slope of the green, down and into the cup.

His first bogey came at the 13th, which he three-putted, and his second came at the 18th, where he hit his tee shot into the trees.

Garganese went out in 36, missed 14th, fourth and eighth. He missed the green with his second shot at the fourth, was trapped at the seventh and three-putted at the eighth. He came home in 35, even par, getting a bogey at the 17th, but rapped in a 30-footer for a birdie on the 18th. Otherwise he matched the card.

Throughout his round, he stalked eight five-foot putts and two of 20 feet—at the second and 18th.

Quinn's Putting Off
Quinn, too, was remarkably steady from tee to green, but wasn't as sharp with his putter as he would have liked. In fact, he three-putted four holes and missed a five-footer on another.

Typical fashion, however, he was dangerous from long range and birdied the 14th with a 15-footer and 18th with one of 42 feet.

Coupe, a particularly good putter, helped his game materially by scoring six times, on each nine as he approached with precision and putted with accuracy. He was 35-30-74.

Second round play today will start at 8 o'clock.

Twins Down Bosox Again, 5-2

Setback Is 9th For Boston in Last 10 Tilts

Minneapolis-St. Paul — (AP) — The American League's leading Minnesota Twins scored their seventh straight victory last night, beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-2, with the help of Johnny Klippstein's relief pitching and Bernie Allen's three runs batted in.

Klippstein relieved the Twins starter, Jim Kaat, in the sixth inning after the Red Sox had loaded the bases with one out. One run came home on Bob Tillman's sacrifice fly, but Klippstein blanked Boston the rest of the way.

4th Bosox Loss In Row
The loss was the Red Sox fourth in a row and ninth in their last 10 games.


Kaat, whose record now is 7-7, yielded a run in the fifth on Eddie Bressoud's triple and Chuck Schilling's single. That was Boston's first run in 22 innings off Twins' pitching in the four-game series swept by Minnesota.

Allen delivered a two-run single in the second inning, after a walk to Don Mincher and a double by Earl Battey.

4 Boston Errors
Allen's sacrifice fly brought in another run in the fourth after singles by Sandy Valdespino and Battey and one of four errors by the Boston outfield.

The Twins got a run off Jim Lonborg, the losing pitcher, in the third on Tony Conigliaro's three-base error and Jimmie Hall's sacrifice fly. Harmon Killebrew also drove in a run with a sacrifice fly in the seventh.

The forces of the "old guard" were depleted in the first two rounds of match play in the R.I. Amateur golf championship yesterday as youth had its day.

Consequently, when play started at 8:30 o'clock this morning a quartet of young contenders will be taking in the glory of the quarterfinals for the first time.

The new generation did a thorough job yesterday. Its onslaught, being paced by the elimination of the defending champion, Fred Campanelli of Metacomb, by 21-year-old Glen Pratt of the host club.

Marching through the first round with Pratt were Joe Paolodis (20), John Basta (20), and Eric LaFerre (21) of Wampanoag and Mike Moeller (21) of Pawtucket. Upholding the honor of those who have been stars in this event for several years, medalist Ed Mauro of Metacomb and former champion Raulo Quinn of West Warwick each won a brace of matches.

They will be joined in the quarterfinals today by Moeller, Manny Pappas of Wampanoag, LaFerre, Dave Thurnott of Wampanoag, Brown Reavey of Wampanoag, 4 and 2, then Bruce Rouse of Warwick, 4 and 2. Postus outlasted Alex Mansour of Valley, 1 up, and repeated against Bruce Martin of West Warwick, 4 and 2.

LaFerre first topped Ed Wholey of Metacomb, 3 and 2, then won from Campanelli's conqueror, Pratt, 3 and 2. Thurnott downed Lou Plazak of Valley, 2 and 1, and Larry Kish of Metacomb, 1 up.

On his way to that second-round match, Kish won a thriller from Paul Butler of Potowomut in a 22-hole duel.

11 Holes
Brown defeated Dino Gargano of Pawtucket, 3 and 1, and Frank McBride of RICC, a former champion, 1 up. Riemer, 2-up winner over John McLellan of Warwick in the morning round, had to go 21 holes before he could defeat Stan Abrams of Metacomb in the afternoon.

Mauro had to put on a finishing surge in the afternoon for he was two down after 12 holes. Basta having secured the 13th by sinking a 30-foot chip.

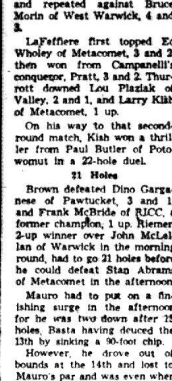

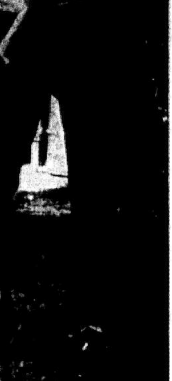

Mauro, Thurrott Reach R.I. Golf Final

Brothers-in-law to Clash For Amateur Crown Today

It will be a family duel, between brothers-in-law, in the 36-hole final round of the State Amateur Golf Championship today at the Warwick Country Club.

The contenders, known for one of the state's most cherished sports events, will be Ed Mauro of Metacomb and Dave Thurrott of Wannamoisett, who is married to Ed's sister, Roberta.

Each scored impressive triumphs in gaining the final year-

today. They will tee off at 10 a.m. today for the first phase of their duel and at 1:30 p.m. for the second 18 holes. The confrontation comes on one of the most picturesque courses in New England, truly in championship trim.

From its beginning on Wednesday, the title tourney has provided dramatic bits, but this last twist, making it a family affair, overshadowed all other developments, particularly since it was Mauro who got his brother-in-law interested in golf and has constantly helped him with his game. Now, it's Thurrott, whom Mauro must best to get the title he has been seeking for 20 years.

Mauro Over Quins
The 32-year-old Mauro, a precise and seasoned shotmaker, who is as much the student of golf stroke as Ted Williams was of the baseball swing, yesterday ousted the favorite for the title, Ronnie Quinn of West Warwick, 3 and 2, with a burst of superlative firing, in the morning quarterfinal round.

He then scored a 1-up decision over the young sensation of the tournament, 14-year-old Dick Mueller of R.I. Country Club. Mauro had to have the shots in the stretch in halting the spectacular advance of the precocious Mueller, who earlier in the tourney had given the impression he might be a budding Bobby Jones.

Thurrott, whose advance to the final came as a complete surprise, considering that he had never qualified for match play in this championship on his four previous challenges, chipped and putted with a magical touch and made recovery shots that had the ring of fiction in getting his two triumphs.

Sensational Recovery

In the morning, he ousted the young and talented Winooski contender, Eric LaFerre, 2 up, and in the afternoon, he eliminated still another capable young chap, Mike Riemer of Pawtucket, 2 and 1. All week, Thurrott has been reeling his foes with his deadly chipping and putting and sensational recovery shots. Again, yesterday, he had LaFerre and Riemer both rubbing their eyes in wonder at the almost unthinkable feat he made in the clutch. He practically all of the four matches he was thought to be the final, his foes getting they had

him, but he wouldn't stay cornered.

An example of it came on the 14th hole of his match with Riemer yesterday. One down at the turn, he bounced back and took three straight holes, the 11th, the 12th, and 13th.

Left Handed

It appeared he surely would lose the 14th after he had knocked his tee shot into trees and his ball ended up near an out-of-bounds marker. He had to play his second shot left-handed but he rolled it a few yards ahead into the clear. Then, he came up with a magnificent approach over round and trap to within 15 feet of

Perry, making his second start of the year, stopped the Yankees on four hits and an unearned run in the day game with ninth-inning relief help from Al Downing. Perry's squeeze bunt off Iowa White Sox opened the game's scoring in the fifth and Zola Versalles followed with his ninth home run. Singles by Versalles, Tony Oliva and Sandy Valdespino accounted for the final Minnesota run in the eighth.

The Twins were leading when Johnny Killebrew reeled, Dick Stetten with the bases full and none out in the eighth. Killebrew had already hit a homer in his last nine and two-thirds innings pitched, but Boyer sprang that with a small for his ninth.

The blow gave the victory to Pete Mikkelsen, who had relieved Mel Stottlemyre in the seventh. Mikkelsen, in turn, needed help from Steve Hamilton in the ninth in which the Twins scored their last run. Stigman, who had come on for Jim Grant in the seventh, was the loser.

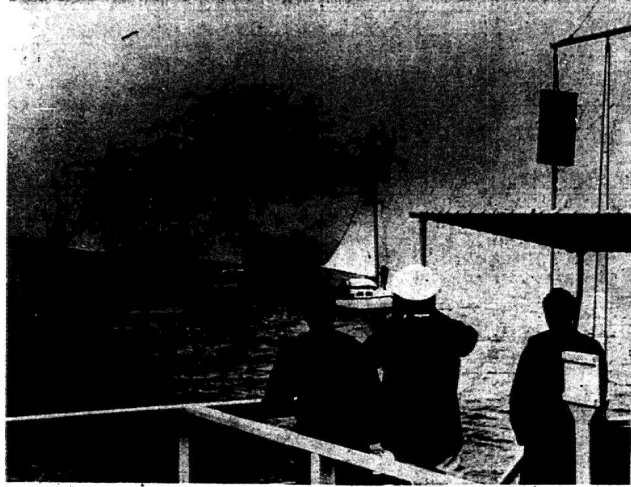

Tom Yawkey, Bosox Owner, Declares Club Not for Sale

Boston — (AP) — Tom Yawkey, owner of the Boston Red Sox, said yesterday his American League baseball club is not for sale.

Refuting reports earlier in the week that he would be receptive to an offer from what he considered a proper local group, Yawkey said:

"I am 62 years young and intend to own the ball club for many years to come."

The dean of major-league owners said he has several substantial offers in his files but doesn't care to publish them.

"Although disappointed by the showing of the club," he said, "one does not wish to ap-

pear panicky by any sale talk that was published concerning the same thought first expressed by me during the time of the CBS-Yankees sale last fall."

Yawkey had been quoted as saying he would entertain an offer to sell the ninth-place team if the offer came from a Boston-area group that convinced him it had the best interests of baseball, the Red Sox and New England fans at heart.

He also said he hadn't put the team on the block and wasn't soliciting offers.

He did receive at least one offer that was made public — from E.M. Loe, theater magnate from Milton, Mass.

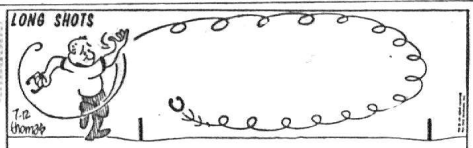

Dodgers Split With Bucs As Koufax Wins His 15th

Pittsburgh — (AP) — Sandy Koufax became the major first 15-game winner by pitching a five-hitter in Los Angeles' 4-2 first game victory over Pittsburgh yesterday. The Pirates won the nightcap, 4-3, on Manny Mota's two-out home run in the 10th inning. The split left the Dodgers in second place in the National League, three percentage points behind the Cincinnati Reds, who lost to Milwaukee, 2-1. Mota connected against Bob Miller for his second homer into the lower right-field seats. Koufax, who has lost only three times, posted his ninth straight triumph, longest streak in the majors this season, and brought his major-league-leading streak total to 155 with 10. The 25-year-old southpaw gave up first-inning home runs to Ron Bailey and Don Clements on a single to Bill Mazeroski, then settled down and allowed only two more singles the rest of the way. He held Roberto Clemente in check, stopping the right fielder's hitting streak at 20 straight games. Koufax also had two singles, driving in the Dodgers' first run in the third inning after Jeff Torborg had tripped. Los Angeles went ahead 1-0 in the fourth, scoring two unearned runs after Lou Johnson had reached first on Gene Freese's wild throw. Singles by Ron Riaty and Jim Lefebvre brought in Johnson, and Freese dashed home on catcher Steve Virgil's passed ball. His week Mauro has been playing good golf over the lush Warwick C.C. course. Yesterday his brother-in-law caught him at his peak and found himself six down almost quicker than he could say "It's no way to treat a buddy." Ed won six of the first seven holes. Thurrott's par 3-35-40 and rest assured it takes a lot of doing to match it. However, yesterday morning Mauro raced through the front nine in 32, treating himself to four birdies in the process. Coming back he had a 39 and went to lunch four up. In the afternoon Ed was 35 to the turn and was seven up. Thurrott, despite his understandable nervousness at finding himself in the final, made it a battle by firing a succession of recovery shots which clearly demonstrated that he doesn't give up easily either. Mauro bogied the first hole after the best of the green with his approach but Thurrott, normally an excellent putter, took three on that green and was one down. It wasn't a prophetic start but from there to the ninth Mauro was little short of sensational, despite the rain.

With his chip, taking a five-foot putt, he got a halve, and the round ended with Mauro to four up.

Eight Straight Fours Starting the afternoon tour Mauro, again hot, fired eight straight fours at Thurrott—seven on pars and a bogie. With rain falling heavily at times, Thurrott didn't leave many openings for Dave.
