Lytham St Anne, England — (AP) — Bob Charles, a left-handed New Zealander and winner of the title here six years ago, carved a two-stroke lead as the iron-fisted golfer from the United States dropped back yesterday in the first round of the British Open.

Charles equaled his own course record of 66 for the Royal Lytham and St Anne's layout and actually set a record because Lytham has been revamped and lengthened to 6,848 yards since Charles' 66 in 1955.

Baltimore — (AP) — Brooks Robinson's 14th homer launched a four-run burst in the fourth inning and the Baltimore Orioles won on defeated the Boston Red Sox, 4-0, last night behind the three-hit pitching of Mike Cuellar.

The victory extended Baltimore's lead in the American League East Division to 1½ games over Boston and Detroit, which are in a virtual tie for second place.

The Orioles, hitting until Robinson's homer, then rapped

five consecutive hits off rookie Mike Naggy, whose record now is 5-2.

Ellie Hendricks singled, Dave Johnson doubled and both runners scored when third baseman Dick Schofield threw wildly to the plate on an infield hit by Mark Belanger. Cuellar then doubled scoring Belanger.

Cuellar blanked a Boston team which collected 22 hits in Friday night's second game here. The Oriole pitcher also

ended Reggie Smith's 19-game hitting streak, longest in the American League this season.

Tony Conigliaro accounted for all three Boston hits with a single in the second, a double in the fifth and a single in the eighth.

Last night's game was witnessed by a crowd of 36,048 which upped the attendance for the four games of the series thus far to 18,170.

The victory enabled the Orioles to edge back in front of the Sox in their season series. Of the 11 games played, the Orioles have won six.

The series draws to a close today with a twilight game, scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Either Lee Stange (3-6) or Jim Lonborg (6-2) will be on the mound for the Sox.

## Lutz, McBride Reach Golf Final Quinn, Mauro Eliminated In Rhode Island Semifinals

Norm Lutz of Pawtucket, a persistent challenger, and 20-year-old Pete McBride of Lincoln, captain-elect of the Providence College golf team, will meet today for the Rhode Island amateur golf championship at Wannamassa.

They surged into the title round by triumphing in rain-drenched semifinals yesterday afternoon, scoring their victories over established stars of the state golfing realm. Lutz defeated the four-time winner of the event, Ronnie Quinn of West Warwick, 4 and 3, and McBride outlasted another former titlist, Ed Mauro of Metacomb, 2 and 1.

Neither had reached the final of the state tourney until they defied rain, lightning and strong opposition performing the feat yesterday. They will start their 36-hole duel for the crown at 9 a.m. and begin the second round at approximately 1 p.m. If they continue their scoring feats of the past few days, Lutz and Mauro were at the 12th green when discretion dictated that they seek shelter. They resumed play about 40 minutes later.

Lutz, playing his normally steady game and getting a lot of help from his putter, was even par for the first nine and two under for the inward holes required to run out the match. Quinn, meanwhile, was again having trouble with short

putts, the one weak spot in his links armament.

The Pawtucket star birdied the first hole with a 25-foot putt, went one up and kept that lead until Quinn rolled in a 20-foot, curling, downhill putt for a birdie at the fifth.

Lutz went ahead again at the sixth when Ronnie missed a four-foot putt and Norm increased his margin to two with a par-three at the eighth. There, Quinn missed the green with his tee shot, played a weak pitch on his second and took a four.

Both missed the green with approaches at the ninth, Lutz ball coming to rest on the side of a small knoll. He had a sharp downhill lie and his pitch ran across the green. Quinn, from a better lie, pitched eight feet or so from the hole, whence he two-putted. Lutz salvaged a halve by putting up another from the apron of the green, a putt of perhaps 40 feet.

Quinn birdied the 10th from 12 feet, cutting his deficit to one hole, but he three-putted the 11th, losing it Norm, an excellent putter, rolled in a 25-footer for a winning birdie at the 12th and an eight-footer for another winning birdie at the 14th, building his four-hole lead.

Mauro got away well against McBride, sinking a 14-foot putt for a birdie at the first hole, but lost his hole at the second when he hit his approach into a trap. McBride, with his third straight par, moved ahead at the third hole. Mauro, at the 42-year-old's pace, assumed the lead again at the eighth when he birdied, but losing his tee shot eight feet from the pin.

## England's Tony Jacklin Wins British Open by 2

Lytham-St. Annes, England — (AP) — Tony Jacklin, a 25-year-old Englishman, won the British Open Golf championship yesterday, finishing with 75-70-68-72 for 285, four under par, and became the first Englishman to capture the 109-year-old title since 1951.

Bob Charles, the left-handed New Zealander, who had won the 1963 title over the same course, also shot a one-over-par 72 and finished second at 292.
