# Tony C. Quits Baseball; Says His Sight Gone



## Conig Leaves Angels After Umpire Clash

Boston — (AP) — Tony Conigliaro, one of baseball's most feared sluggers until this season, abruptly announced his retirement from the game at the age of 26 yesterday, saying that falling eyesight and other ailments were responsible for his move.

"This is the end of Tony C.," Conigliaro said after leaving the California Angels and flying to Boston and an airport meeting with his family. "I've learned that health is more important than money."

Conigliaro went hitless in eight times at bat and was ejected in the 10th inning for arguing with the umpires in the Angels' 1-0, 20-inning loss at Oakland Friday night.

At a dawn press conference after the game, Conigliaro said, "I have lost my sight and am on the edge of losing my mind."

He boarded a flight for Boston three hours later.

"I just can't see the ball," said Conigliaro, who suffered a serious eye injury when hit by a pitch while with the Boston Red Sox in 1967. "I have no depth perception at all. I have a blind spot."

Conigliaro missed the entire 1968 season because of his injury and his career appeared ended. However, he made a remarkable recovery and hit 20 homers for the Red Sox in 1969 and 36 last year before being traded to California.

This season he has batted only .29 with just four homers and 15 runs batted in.

At this time, I'd say there's no chance I'll ever return to baseball as a player," the young outfielder said during an interview at the airport in Boston. "There's no way I'll return this year and it's very doubtful that I'll try to come back next year."

He said that his sight, a bothersome neck ailment and his overall performance on the field had affected his personality.

"I've been getting headaches and my nerves are ready to crack," Conigliaro said. "I've been getting sick to my stomach a little nervous a little shaky."

The game was affecting me to the point where I was losing control. I was saying things and doing things I didn't want to do. I don't know why. I was just doing them."

Conigliaro smiled and shook his head when he was told that the California manager, Lefty Phillips, had told writers Tony is ready for the insane asylum.

Phillips also said. Apparently his lack of success has been bothering him. The easiest way out is to quit."

That's the way things have been going.

## Blames Mate for Red Sox Woes

# Billy C. Blasts Yastrzemski

New York — (AP) — Billy Conigliaro of the Boston Red Sox reacted to the announced retirement from baseball of his brother, Tony, yesterday, by blaming Carl Yastrzemski for many of the Boston club's problems.

"Tony was traded because of one guy — over there," Billy said, pointing to his teammate, Yastrzemski, in the clubhouse after the Red Sox' 5-3 loss to the New York Yankees.

"You can quote me because I don't care," Billy said. "I know I'm next."

Tony was traded to the California Angels after hitting 36 homers and driving in 116 runs last season. He announced his retirement yesterday because of failing eyesight and other problems.

Billy charged there was a conspiracy on the Red Sox, naming Yastrzemski, Reggie Smith and the team equipment manager.

"It's about time they owned Tom Yawkey and every body broke up," Billy said. "They baby certain people on this team."

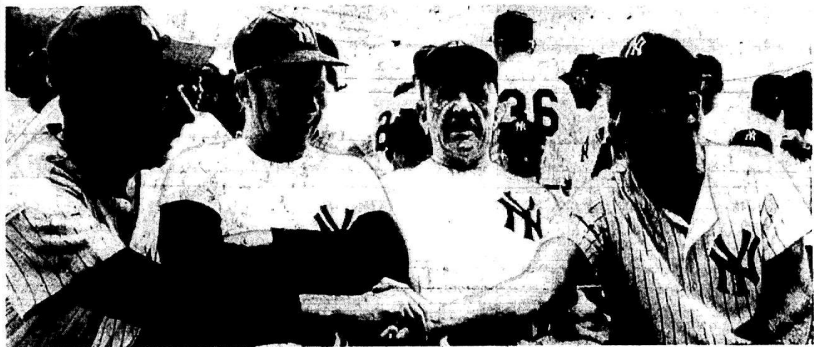
Billy said his brother's troubles with the Red Sox began when Tony yelled at Yastrzemski in Milwaukee last year.

"Yaz didn't run out a double-play ball," he puffed — and Tony yelled at him for it," Billy said. "Tony was the only one to speak up to him because he had guts and that play in Milwaukee started it. Nobody else has enough sleep to say anything to him."

Billy, who has been platooned with Joe Lahoda for the last month, blamed Yastrzemski for his losing regular status.

"He got me benched," Billy said. "Who else got me benched? One guy, him. Didn't he say in the papers that I should be benched? And I'm supposed to play with these guys... Yaz criticized my playing in center field and Reggie says..."
